ducation has always been a cornerstone of a country's economic development program. And for millions of families around the world, especially in developing economies, education is seen as a sure way to improve their lives.

In the last two decades, there has been a sharp rise in the number of students seeking an education abroad. The appeal is clear. Whether it is to acquire a specialized degree from a prestigious school or gain a wide perspective of the world, millions of students have a thirst to venture beyond familiar territory.

As an effective agent of global change, international education helps students transcend barriers - both geographic and cultural. It fosters greater understanding among individuals with very different experiences and backgrounds. It facilitates the sharing of knowledge

As of 2019, there were an estimate 5.5 million international students around the world, a significant percentage of which came from China. As the middle class continues to expand in the world's largest economy, more parents seek an international education for their children.

Meanwhile, technological advances have increased accessibility to quality education. The Internet has made possible distance learning. This year, as the COVID-19 global pandemic carries on, the Internet has allowed schools to continue conducting their courses, giving rise to a new idea in education: blended learning.

Traditional on-site classes may be on hold for now in many places. But 2020 has shown the world one thing: Schools were well-equipped to adapt quickly to a major disruption. That could not have happened were it not for an innovative mindset and for technology, developed and improved upon over several decades by students and scientists from universities around the world, all with a shared commitment to education and a clear vision of its objective.

Initiatives put Chinese students first

Curtin University, ranked in the top one per cent of universities worldwide, has a range of initiatives to ensure Chinese students can benefit from its highly respected, global education.

Response to the pandemic

Prior to the pandemic, Chinese students comprised the second largest group of non-Australian students at Curtin Perth, enjoying the university's range of internationally recognized courses, its emphasis on practical learning and Perth's safe, sunny environment.

When COVID-19 intensified, Curtin transitioned more than 150 courses to online delivery, allowing students in China and around the world to obtain an Australian degree despite travel restrictions.

The University has also launched several new scholarships, including the AUD\$5,000 Starter Support Scholarship, to support students who can't

"These initiatives are integral to supporting our students during these uncertain times," says Curtin Deputy Vice-Chancellor International Professor Seth Kunin.

Student exchange

Curtin is strengthening its existing student exchange programs and developing new opportunities to implement when international travel

Curtin already has partnerships with universities including Nanjing Audit University, South China Normal University and Yanshan University.

Under these arrangements, undergraduate Chinese students can begin studying at their home university and may be eligible for online English tuition from Curtin valued at AUD\$6,295 before travelling to Curtin Perth when it is safe to do so.



Graduates receive an undergraduate degree from Curtin, or depending on the arrangement, from Curtin and their home university.

Professor Anping Yu, Vice-President of Nanjing Audit University, which has had a 16-year partnership with Curtin, says more than 900 students have graduated from their articulation program and have helped form a cultural bridge between the two nations.

"Our alumni are active in all kinds of fields in economic society and they have been the medium of cooperation, communication and cultural exchange between China and Australia," he says.

Curtin has also developed course pathway options with Xiamen National Accounting Institute and Yanshan University to help Chinese students progress with their postgraduate studies in Australia.

Research opportunities

Curtin is involved in collaborations with Chinese universities that give PhD students and researchers opportunities to create lasting positive change.

This includes alliances with Fudan University to improve cross-cultural understanding about writing in Australia and China, and with Sun Yat-sen University to better support people on the autism spectrum.

Curtin has also joined forces with Nanjing University, Shanghai Jiao Tong University, Tongji University, Huazhong University of Science and Engineering, and Harbin Institute of Technology to solve industry problems in megaproject management practice.

"We are pleased to be working with such highly ranked universities to address challenges facing industries and communities in China and Australia," Professor Kunin says.

As one of the two countries in Asia-Pacific with a majority of native English speakers, Australia has been a favorite destination for thousands of students in the region seeking a world-class education abroad and first-rate qualifications that are recognized anywhere in the world.

The appeal of Australia, among these international students, lies in the multicultural diversity of its population, the variety of its natural surroundings and urban centers, and its easygoing lifestyle. And because of its geographic proximity, the country remains a favorite among Chinese students.

So, when the coronavirus pandemic erupted last year, the government had the daunting task of keeping the country's education sector just as attractive and making it more resilient because its universities, schools and other education providers is among the biggest generators of revenue.

Minister Tehan spoke to GMI Post last year and outlined the various measures taken by the federal government to address the COVID-19 global pandemic. The minister emphasized the importance of ensuring the health and safety of everybody in the education sector, providing students with flexible options to continue their studies and further strengthen the sector to maintain its attractiveness to international students.

GMI Post: How have Australian universities adapted to recent changes in the global educational environment?

Tehan: Australia focused on suppressing the

COVID-19 virus and ensuring the safety of every resident in this country. Australia has done well on both the health and economic fronts compared to most countries around the world.

Australian Higher Education and Vocational Education and Training (VET) providers received support from the Australian Government, including our regulators, in implementing temporary online delivery options for both domestic and international students. This effort served the health and wellbeing interests of

students and the broader community while

Australia stays at the top of its game

Tehan: Australia is a world leader in quality international education and training. Our success is built on our reputation for providing a world-class education and for nurturing a safe and welcoming environment in which to study, live and work.

Five Australian universities are in the global top 50 on the QS World University Rankings 2021, 11 others are in the top 200. Eight Australian universities were ranked in the top 100 in the world for graduate employability. Also, in 2019, three Australian cities featured in the top 10 most livable cities in the world (Melbourne #2, Sydney #3 and Adelaide #10).

Education in Australia is underpinned by a strong regulatory system that ensures not only the quality but also support for international students. Universities are required to support students so they can adjust to life in and outside of the campus. They have strategies in place for students who are at risk of failing their course. They must also have support staff to meet the needs of international students, including those studying online or by distance learning.

We also have a world-leading legislative framework for supporting the high-quality delivery of education to international students, which guarantees that international student fees will be reimbursed or that students are transferred if an institution ceases operations.

GMI Post: How do international students contribute positively to Australia?

Tehan: International students are our friends, classmates, colleagues and members of our community. International education brings a cultural and linguistic depth to our schools, vocational institutions, universities, workplaces and communities, which help all students gain skills and allow them to take advantage of the opportunities arising in an increasingly globalized and technologically interconnected world.

Australia is an open, friendly, multicultural society. We have welcomed people from all over the world to share in our community. Australians embrace different cultures and we embrace our international students.

GMI Post: How important are Chinese students, in particular, to Australia?

Tehan: Australia warmly welcomes Chinese students into our country and our communities. China is also one of the most popular destinations for Australian students participating in student mobility programs funded by the Australian Government's New Colombo Plan.

China has long been Australia's largest source of international students with more than 212,000 Chinese students studying here in 2019. When Chinese students return home, they are

representatives of the quality and value of the Australian education system and continue being an important part of the people to people link between our countries.

This strong basis of student exchange has long been the foundation of an incredibly rich and diverse education relationship between our two countries.

GMI Post: What distinguishes Australia from other Commonwealth countries when it comes to its international educational experience for Chinese students?

Tehan: Australian schools are among the finest in the world because small class sizes, university-trained and qualified teachers, world-class curricula and high-quality facilities. Our practical, competency based Vocational Education and Training system is integrated with industry, with teaching conducted by experienced industry professionals to ensure that students gain real-world skills needed for 21st century jobs. Our higher education system has a strong track record as seen in our representation in world rankings and has a long history of producing world-leading research.


Australia is attractive to students for the same reason that it is one of the world's most popular tourist destinations. Our diverse natural environment offers a range of experiences from golden beaches to national parks and our unique plants and animals.

Australia also has generous work rights for those with student visas. They are able to work up to 40 hours per fortnight during a semester and full-time during the semester break. This can be a great way to find study-related work, which enables students to make connections with the community beyond the classroom while making friends and, for many international students, providing a great opportunity to improve their English language skills. Poststudy students may be eligible to continue living and working in Australia for a further two years.

GMI Post: What measures is Australia taking to attract more international students?

Tehan: Our staff both in Australia and overseas continuously work with governments around the world to build connections, share policies and promote the country as a world-leading education destination. Our regulators have also recognized the need for flexibility at this time and have provided much needed support to ensure that international students are able to engage with Australian institutions and their fellow students.

Australian governments and universities are working hard to bring students back, initially through pilot projects, to ensure that we have put in place the right arrangements to protect public health and support students.

How governments and schools have adapted to the COVID-19 global pandemic









"The guidelines of IRCC (Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada) on allowing international students to study online were very helpful. I think they had to react immediately to put instruction online. They did really a good job in upskilling their faculty and their teaching staff quickly.

They also conducted training in the technology to migrate instruction online. There are still a lot of programs that need online migration, those that are more hands-on, vocational programs that require some face-to-face learning.

We launched a website with all sorts of information about education at Cambridge, face coverings, and COVID-19 testing, including for our students who are symptomatic and asymptomatic.

The campaign is not about only how we are going to teach students but also how they can get the most out of life in Cambridge, like social, sports and cultural activities. We ensure that those activities are carried out in a Covid-safe way and make sure they follow, even exceed, health protocols and precautions by putting elements in place that allow all of us to looking out for each other and ourselves."

The positive side was that we

realized we could succeed online. We saw ways in which we could expand parts of our programs and accommodate our students' needs. It opened up the world, wherein we could entertain the idea of having a more extensive and successful online curriculum and reach more students on a global scale.

We've also been approached by other Chinese groups to set up online Mandarin-based courses and deliver some of our programs directly to the Chinese community. That's a very concrete example of potential larger opportunities coming our way.

President Vancouver Film School https://vfs.edu British universities introduced a wide range of measures, such as enhanced cleaning and improved ventilation, adjusted timetables to limit contact between groups and changes to university layouts to comply with social distancing guidelines, which allowed them to deliver high-quality education and learning while minimizing the risk to staff and students.

All universities are expected to have comprehensive outbreak management plans in place, which have been approved by local public health teams. Last summer, they worked closely with the national and local governments to put plans in place to ensure their students' safety in the event of a COVID-19 outbreak on campus. Now, all UK universities are well prepared for local outbreaks.

A world-class education in an iconic location

Innovative. Dynamic. Diverse. These characteristics draw over a quarter of a million international students to New South Wales (NSW) each year. From the vibrant city life of Sydney, Newcastle and Wollongong to the breathtaking scenery of the North, Central and South Coasts and Country and Outback NSW, the state hosts unique experiences for every type of student.



Accounting for about 40 percent of Australia's foreign student population, NSW is home to the country's leading universities, secondary schools, English colleges and vocational education providers. The state has remained highly attractive because it affords the opportunity to get a quality education while enjoying the scenic lifestyle and entrepreneurial culture Australia is known for.

NSW is home to more universities than any other Australian state, including QS World Rankings top placers such as the University of Sydney, University of New South Wales, University of Technology Sydney, University of Newcastle, and University of Wollongong.

A hotbed of innovation, creativity, and culture, Sydney attracts students from around the world and is consistently ranked in the top five student cities in the world. With 40% of the city's residents born in another country, the city has nurtured a multicultural diversity not found in other parts of the world.

While Sydney mostly appeals to young students seeking an urban buzz, other NSW regions suit those seeking adventure, whether amid the greenery or the beaches.

"Based on an international student survey, over 90% of students report a high level of satisfaction in NSW. It's even higher in these



smaller regions that are uncrowded, where students have better work opportunities because businesses really value the experiences and the skills that these international students bring," said Peter Mackey, NSW Government's Director for International Education and the Head of Study NSW.

Study NSW was established in 2014 as a dedicated unit of the NSW Government to support, enhance and improve the experience of international students in the state. As NSW's largest service export, international education plays an integral role in the state's economic development, contributing billions of dollars and supporting thousands of local jobs.

In 2019, NSW hosted nearly 300,000 international students from 160 different countries, with Chinese students making up around 29 percent of that group. Beyond their economic contribution, the NSW Government values the impact that international students have in fostering strong communities and building bridges between the state and the rest of the world.

"International education is at the center of the NSW Government's international strategy in terms of how we position ourselves into the world. International students are key to building long-term bilateral relationships. Every one of our students that returns home with a positive experience feels closer and more connected to NSW and is more likely to invest here or buy our goods and services," said Mackey.

84 percent of international students return overseas after their studies, many becoming influential in business, research and government, deepening ties between Australia and other countries. These individual stories are a powerful collective force in trade, diplomatic and innovation networks.

International students are important members of local communities, contributing to the state's cultural capital. When the COVID-19 pandemic hit in 2020, the impact of international education became more evident. Study NSW doubled its efforts in staying present amongst

its international students both onshore and offshore.

"The first thing we did when COVID hit was to create an international student hub on our website because we know students need a trusted, reliable source of information. The hub is available in different languages, including Chinese, so that students and families, whether they're here or at home, can understand what services are accessible to them," said Mackey.

Leveraging this platform, Study NSW continues to extend their help to international students. Early in the pandemic, the State Government also announced a significant international student welfare package. The \$20+ million relief package includes a temporary housing scheme and student support services, such as legal and referrals support.

"We're addressing international student food insecurity. We have partnered with an organization here called Foodbank, and we're distributing over 62,000 emergency food hampers to struggling students. We've really tried to make sure international students know that they're part of our family and our community and that they're not left behind," said Mackey

Mackey's team is planning for the safe return of international students in 2021. Under the Australian Prime Minister's guidelines, they are devising a plan which sets the gold standard for safety and security for international students.

"NSW is an extremely safe, welcoming, and multicultural society. The message that I want to highlight to our Chinese students stuck overseas is that we're thinking of them, and we're looking forward to welcoming them back. We're really doing everything we can to open our borders as quickly as we can," said Mackey.

CANADA Staying open to the world

Canada has a long, rich history of immigration. As one of the world's largest countries in terms of area, the country has benefitted from pioneering individuals and, until now, welcomes immigrants looking for better lives or wanting to contribute to nation-building.

That openness is evident in the continuous growth of Canada's education sector, which has seen an expansion in the number of international students applying to universities and the number of countries from where they originate.

"Canada continues to value the important contributions of international students within our communities. We recognize that people-to-people ties are foundational to building sustainable global cooperation. Advancing internationalization is critical to Canada's global engagement, and remains core to our organizational mandate," said Larissa Bezo, president and CEO of the Canadian Bureau for International Education.

As Canada and China marked the 50th anniversary of the establishment of bilateral ties, Canadian universities and government agencies have highlighted the important contributions made by the students from the world's largest economy, which now accounts for the largest group of international students in the country.

"International students bring diversity, top talent, high skill sets and motivation that provide long-term economic, social and cultural benefits to the province of Manitoba," said Ralph Eichler, the province's minister for economic development and

Livia Castellanos, executive lead of international education at the ministry of advanced education of Saskatchewan, expressed similar sentiments and highlighted the province's efforts to strengthen its network with Chinese schools and universities: "We have engaged in many conversations with our post-secondary institutions and with colleagues in China because the country is a partner for Saskatchewan and Canadian education."

Because the COVID-19 global pandemic caused a huge disruption and much uncertainty to the plans of thousands of international students, Canada has had to quickly implement measures to ensure their safety and deliver continuity to their education. The travel restrictions put in place because of the pandemic affected more than 650,000 students from the country and elsewhere in the world.

"Early on, when we saw some countries and communities turn their back on international students, we embraced them. That was one of the responses that we saw in Canada before the pandemic. That approach will continue post-pandemic," Universities Canada President and CEO Paul Davidson said.

The extra effort to accommodate international students in the middle of the pandemic was readily seen in Canada's 10 provinces and three territories.

"Our country is a very welcoming place for international students and parents can have a great deal of confidence that their children will be safe," said Randall Martin, the executive director of the BC Council for International Education.

In the eastern end of Canada, the province of Nova Scotia needed to intensify its collaboration with its network of schools, colleges and universities to provide all types of services and support for its international students, particularly those from China.

"We were able to do that in advance. Students received full support and felt that the government of Nova Scotia cared about their long-term mental health, security and safety. That was because we were acting collaboratively," said Nicole Johnson-Morrison, president and CEO of EduNova, the cooperative industry association of schools and professional training providers in the province.

Given the diverse and unique demographics of each region and their differing needs, each of the provincial governments, through their ministries, was able to bring forward their concerns to the federal government in Ottawa and receive the needed support.

Because of that continued commitment to reach out to Chinese students, and buoyed by the success of its health and safety measures, the government is very confident that the spirit of collaboration within the entire education sector will stay as strong.

"International students from all countries are important to New Brunswick and all are welcome here because they contribute to our province's cultural mosaic. That said, China has been the number one source of international students for us. Many universities have academic research relationships and other affiliations with Chinese universities, which results in a valuable interchange of students and ideas," said Leigh Watson, "New Brunswick "government spokesperson.

Challenge accepted. Achievement unlocked.

Nobody could have predicted how 2020 would unfold. For Paul Davidson, the president of Universities Canada, last year couldn't have had a worse start. On 8 January 2020, flight 852 of Ukraine International Airlines crashed in Tehran, killing all 176 passengers and crew, among them 63 undergraduate and graduate students, and faculty members from 18 Canadian universities

Still reeling from that tragedy, just a few weeks later, Canada reported its first case of COVID-19 on its shores. Canadian universities were among students also value the chance not only to study the first to understand the COVID-19's impact because of their close connections with places like China. They saw the impact of the virus early and how China dealt with the virus as visa applications centers and language testing centers shut down.

In an interview last year with GMI Post, Davidson took stock of the year gone by and how Canada's schools and universities adapted to major challenges brought about by the global pandemic. Looking forward, Davidson also expounds on the new normal for his country's education sector. Universities Canada is a nongovernmental, membership-based association of private and public not-for-profit Canadian universities

GMI Post: Given your involvement in the education sector, both in government and the private sector, what trends you have seen emerge this year?

Davidson: Canada's universities responded really well and very quickly, moving all their undergraduate learners online in a span of 10 days. We were able to complete the winter term successfully. Campuses were depopulated very quickly out of concern for the safety of the students and faculty. University residences were repurposed to accommodate frontline healthcare workers to protect their families.

I also want to underscore how in those first few days and weeks, there was particular care and attention to how international students in Canada were being treated. Universities kept their residences open for them. They kept the meal plans going. They helped the students find work in the summer. They worked with immigration officials to extend study permits. That's really something that Canada is proud of.

a pluralistic experiment. We have a very large number of international students that come from a wide range of countries. Because we

are such a multicultural society, sometimes we can't even tell the international student from the Canadian student. That makes the international students very comfortable.

Perhaps most significantly, our schools enabled international students to enroll online until such time our borders are reopened. Aside from that, the time spent on online study will be considered when international students apply for postgraduate work permits.

That's another feature of our system. We see international students as a real asset to Canada and our economy. Meanwhile, international here but also get first-hand work experience. Our immigration rules permit international students to work while they're studying and stay after graduation. That's a compelling offer.

GMI Post: How have universities adapted to this new normal?

Davidson: It has been a tumultuous year for everyone and I really feel for international students and their parents who are trying to figure out what they might do next and where they might go. However, the enduring values of Canadian education persists: high quality education, safety and security, and a welcoming environment in a dynamic, progressive country. Our multiculturalism really welcomes diversity and favors young people. Canada is a great place to be if you're a young person.

With the pandemic, universities transformed their educational offerings to maintain their high quality and presented a variety of options. Some small liberal arts undergraduate colleges operate in-person classes. There are parts of the country where the pandemic hasn't interrupted activity.

Then, every university in the country offers online experiences. Depending on whether health and safety conditions allow, some universities are offering more hybrid experiences, which blend synchronous and asynchronous opportunities. We understand it is a challenge for students to be out of the classroom for between 12 and 14 hours a day. So, universities are adapting to allow students to study at a time of their choosing. Some have invested in technology like virtual reality to create an experience that is as immersive as

Many schools are also aware that education Canada lives a multicultural environment. It lives is not just about courses or the time spent in front of your computer. Education is also about building communities. So, we have seen Canadian universities organize online extra-



curricular clubs and experiences, like work internships and co-ops.

Another underreported aspect is the participation of alumni groups, which reached out to students, both to Canadian and international. With regards to China, there are many highly successful Chinese leaders in government, business, and society who have strong connections to Canadian universities and a deep fondness for their experience in Canada. Some alumni groups have extended scholarships and emergency bursary support. That's evidence of the kind of community that Canadian universities develop and the sense of affiliation that alumni feel over their lifetime.

GMI Post: What are your priorities in the next 2 to 3 years?

Davidson: As we look to the future, it's about growing the number of international students because we have the capacity to serve more. It's also about encouraging outbound mobility so that Canadian students get more international experience. We want to be partners and not poachers of talent. We want to build talent together.

Another rapidly growing area is integrated learning in co-ops and internships, which forms part of our international development strategy. We are formulating strategy that aims to provide every student with a co-op internship as part of his undergraduate experience. That's a new feature of Canada's educational system. We are confident that students will find it appealing because they get a hands-on experience as part of their undergraduate studies.

We continue to push forward cooperation in international research. Through the pandemic, we've seen that science and investing in science are critical. The world has shortened the development of a vaccine from decades to months. But there are also all sorts of areas for research whether it's climate change or social inequality, or see how countries can work together effectively. We share one planet. So, we will promote the drive towards more international research in the years ahead.

We have to keep investing in young people. We have to keep improving our level of knowledge and the breadth of our knowledge so that we can solve these very challenging problems.



United Kingdom has nurtured a deep fondness and clear understanding of Chinese culture. With the continued influx of Chinese students, the country has also valued their positive contributions to their universities and their temporary communities.

"They bring diversity to every institution that they attend. The students, faculty and staff welcome them with open arms. We are an inclusive society and we welcome them. We assure them that, if they come here, they will be provided with the highest quality of education and a rich student experience," a spokesperson for Universities Scotland said.

Universities Scotland also hopes to dispel any worries that Chinese students may have about living thousands of miles away. "Safety. Scotland is a safe, welcoming place. Scotlish universities offer a wide range of services which aim to support student safety and wellbeing. Many Chinese students praise the warm welcome of Scotlish people whose friendly attitude makes them feel like they can always ask for help," the spokesperson also said.

In Wales, the education sector hopes that increased engagement with Chinese students will also widen the global outlook of its local community. At the same time, Chinese students will benefit from learning from the distinct Welsh culture.

"We want international students here in Wales. Our government wants international students here in Wales because we see the value that they bring into our campuses and communities. They also help internationalize the experience for all students. We believe that is just as important," said Gwen Williams, head of international of Universities Wales.

From the four home countries of the United Kingdom, the message is very clear. England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland will be flexible as possible to accommodate Chinese students and will ensure that they are safe and feel like valuable members of the community.

"The sector as a whole has come together on this to make sure that all our institutions are able to provide a safe environment for students to learn. They have been sharing their knowledge and best practices to help each other and see what works best for different types of institutions," said Tom Pinder, strategic business development manager for UK Education Centre.

UK universities go the extra mile

In a post-Brexit world, burdened further by the global COVID-19 pandemic, the United Kingdom has had to identify its competitive advantage. For several years now, the country has capitalized on its education sector. Having some of the world's oldest and most prestigious universities, the UK has remained a very popular option for thousands of students around the world seeking a good education.

A clear demonstration of the importance of the education sector to the economy, the government led by Prime Minister Boris Johnson has appointed Sir Steve Smith as its very first International Education Champion. A former vice chancellor of Exeter University, Professor Smith is tasked with "spearheading activities overseas, open international opportunities, develop strong international partnerships in new and established markets and help tackle challenges and barriers."

Last year, GMI Post interviewed Prof. Smith to gain more insight on this new government position and asked him how the United Kingdom plans to become the preferred destination of foreign students and researchers.

GMI Post: What is the role and mandate of the UK International **Education Champion?**

Smith: The role was created by the British government in March 2019. It is a job that involves the whole of the UK - Scotland, Wales, Northern Ireland and Wales - and considers all the different priorities that they have. The job also applies across the entire education sector.

While my training is in higher education, I will be involved in promoting British schools, British skills and educational qualifications, British educational supplies and equipment, as well as technical education. So, we are looking at all areas of education. The big point, I suppose, is to grow the UK's educational exports.

I am in charge of increasing the number of international students from roughly 485,000 to 600,000 by 2030, and increase the value of international education exports from around 20 billion pounds to around 35 billion within that same period.

It is an ambitious program and reflects the British government's view that the UK is outstandingly strong in education. The government wants to make sure that the UK is seen as one of the obvious areas in the world to go to if you want quality education. As the UK has left the European Union, my mission is very important because we need to show people all over the world that our British education, teaching and research are world-class and that we are a very attractive destination.

GMI Post: What are the competitive advantages of UK universities for international students?

Smith: Our universities operate in a safe environment and look after international students very well. All surveys conducted among students reflect that. Our government has also made it easier for students to secure visas, removed limits on number of international students coming to the UK, and increased the time allowed to work after graduating: two years for graduate and post-graduate students and three years for PhD graduates. Also, international students won't have to leave the UK anymore if they want to move to a new school.

The strength of the UK educational sector is enormous no matter how you look at it. Some rankings put us at 4th among the top 10 of the world. Also, 83% of international students say their UK degree helped them get their job. Whilst many other countries have very strong institutions, the UK happens to have several high-quality universities across the spectrum, from small specialists or colleges to music conservatories up to the large science and technology colleges.



GMI Post: Are there any projects that specifically focus on students from China or other parts of Asia?

Firstly, China is an incredibly important source of students in the UK, with 1 in 3 international students here are Chinese. China is our biggest single market. The very first letter I received as the International Education Champion was from the British Ambassador in Beijing who said how important it was for us to work together and that I should come visit as soon as possible.

I chaired Universities UK International, the body of vice-chancellors of all British universities, for five years and China was always the first country we looked at. That's why I've been there several times recently.

If we're going to meet the target of increasing the number of students to 115 thousand by 2030, a big component will have to come from China. British universities have also built very strong relationships there.

During the COVID-19 crisis, Tsinghua University sent over five ventilators to support our local hospitals. That happened certainly because of its friendship with UK universities.

GMI Post: What are you doing to support and revitalize the education sector during this difficult time?

Smith: Everyone I work with around the world is worried and we're all grappling to deal with the crisis. But the one thing I'm proudest of is how well universities across the UK looked after their students.

At Exeter University, where I was once vice-chancellor, every international student got a phone call from staff twice a week to check how they were. If they were too scared to leave their rooms or if they were homesick and lonely, the school had food parcels delivered to them.

All our universities bent backwards on a human level. Located thousands of miles away from home while a pandemic was happening, some students chose to leave their accommodation. Universities refunded all their accommodation fees for the last two weeks of the spring term up to

We have seen universities across the country invest large amounts of money into distance and online learning, while also making their campuses safer. The government has spoken to us about increasing blended learning, wherein courses are a combination of online sessions and on-site classes.

Recently, Queen's University Belfast arranged the flights for Chinese students. The University of Manchester, Bristol University and Exeter University arranged flights for incoming students. They had staff meet the students at the airport in China, organized a receiving party at the airport here, arranged transportation to their accommodation or selfisolation facilities, if needed.

A lot of universities, like Hampton, for example offering test-and-trace or test-on-track systems on their campuses for everyone. Liverpool University offers free COVID-19 testing. The priority, clearly, has been the welfare of students.

New Zealand Showing the world the way

In New Zealand, life is as normal as it can get despite the global COVID-19 pandemic, which broke out nearly a year ago. To the envy of many nations around the world, the country stemmed the spread of the disease, thanks to quick, decisive action of the government.

Which isn't to say that New Zealand hasn't paid a steep price to secure the health of its citizens. The country sealed its borders to most of the outside world, imposing very strict restrictions on travel. The needed measures have dampened economic activity, including the education sector, a major contributor to gross domestic product.

"The government is acutely aware of the challenges that the sector is currently facing. We are sensitive to the unexpected loss of revenue for international education providers and have made investments that will help cushion the blow," said Minister of Education Chris Hipkins.

"And New Zealand's international education sector will benefit from the strengthened global reputation which we gained because of our handling of the COVID-19 crisis," he added.

The recovery plan announced by the government aims to stabilize the international education sector; to strengthen the educational system through new regulatory regimes, policies and practices; and to accelerate transformation of the entire sector.

"Ultimately we want an international education system that is mutually beneficial for students, providers and benefits New Zealand economically and socially. This coincides with the final plank of the government's five point economic recovery plan, which aims to position New Zealand globally as a place to trade with, invest in, and eventually visit again," Hipkins said.



"I know much of the recovery is dependent on when New Zealand will open its borders again to international students. Providers are eager to get timeframes on when any changes to the border closure will be made. The government will allow international students to return once it is safe to do so," he also said.

In November, the government lifted the blanket ban on international students, allowing first the return of PhD and Masters students who were caught offshore and needed to return to New Zealand to complete their work. Priority will be given to those who must be in the country for the practical components of their research and study.
